Sitting on the panel were (pictured left to right) CW5 (Ret) David Cooper, The first Army Special Operations Aviation Command (ARSOAC) CCWO; CW5 Frank G. Volpe, Jr., Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS) Officer, DA G3/5/7; ARSOAC CCWO CW5 Mark A. Meyer; Aviation Branch Proponent CW4 David J. Stock; and Aviation CWOB CW5 Joseph B. Roland.

Each panelist provided opening remarks, focusing on their specific areas of influence. CW5 (Ret) Cooper shared his perspectives as both a retired senior Warrant Officer leader, and a recipient of the Distinguished Service Cross for extreme gallantry in aerial combat in 2006, during Operation Iraqi Freedom.



The panel fielded numerous questions from the Members in attendance, ranging from equipment modernization to potential shifts in Aviation utilization in future conflicts, both in the conventional and Special Operations missions.

Pictured left, CW5 Harold Griffin asked about the role of UAS aircraft on the future battlefield. Army Vice Chief of Staff GEN James C. McConville had touched briefly on this in his opening address to the Members on Thursday morning.
